I, like many people in this room, have a migrant's story to tell. My story began in 1975, when my wife, my son and I migrated to Australia after spending two years as refugees in West Germany.

So I understand well, the sentiment expressed in the multicultural statement by Amina Siro, just after she arrived in Melbourne from Aleppo, Syria – "learn English, look for a job, and try to join the community. That's how we started back then in 1975!

That was a long time ago... since then our expectations have exceeded our wildest dreams.

And I believe that has been possible only because of the country we chose to settle in.

During our journey, we have seen the challenges created and faced by the many waves of migrants to this land. But with each wave of migration, we felt new and exciting layers were being added to the pillars of our nation. This is something of which we can be justly proud.

I hope that this new multicultural statement inspires you and renews your enthusiasm for the vibrant, harmonious and inclusive multicultural Australia we can be.
